A Peace That the World Cannot Give

In a recent newsletter from the Buffalo diocese that was sent to some of us, the spiritual reflection focused in part on the "Lilies of the Field" parable from Matthew's gospel. As the unrest in society continues, I thought this an appropriate theme as well. This passage, found in the midst of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, seeks to move his disciples from anxiety to trust in the providence of the Father.

At the very center of Jesus' 'Sermon' is the Lord's Prayer. (In English – 1111 words before, and 1046 after.) Perhaps it is not by accident that it sits at the center. Jesus is saying that prayer must be at the center of the life of a disciple. The seven petitions of the Our Father teach us how to approach God and how to properly orient our minds toward the one who created us. A few verses later, he teaches us what should be the proper fruits of prayer: that we not worry but consider the birds of the air and the lilies of the field and how, in the eyes of God, we are more valuable than they. God is watching over us in the midst of all trials.



Jesus is aware of the same anxiety in his apostles at the Last Supper. He wishes and offers them peace "not as the world gives it" but is one, since it comes from him, and since he comes from heaven (John 6:51), it is an unearthly peace. We want this peace for our whole world, but the difficulty is that there is a price to be "paid" for this peace. It is the price of discipleship which calls us to take up the cross and follow him. This cross that we accept draws us close to Christ; and if we draw near to him, he will draw near to us (James 4:8). It is near to him that we find a peace that passes all understanding (Phil. 4:6). Perhaps what we need at this time is less internet, less news, and more prayer so we may have more peace—a peace that the world cannot give. DeColores!

I try to bring Christ into my work environment as a dental hygienist. Many people have anxiety or fear over dental visits.

One little girl had a bad previous experience and was afraid. I showed her my instruments and explained things to her, and assured her I could stop anytime. Her mother was supportive. We completed the visit without problems, and the girl hugged me.

As I checked a little boy's teeth recently, he raised his hand as if he might grab my hand. I showed him the instrument I was using to check his teeth and explained it was sharp – but I was being very careful to not hurt him. I told him if he grabbed my hand he could get hurt. I had to remind him a couple more times to keep his hand down, but he did relax more and trusted me.

Last week, I saw a woman who was anxious from the time she entered the office, including over the cost of x-rays. The doctor reassured her that if her insurance didn't cover it, she wouldn't be charged. As I worked on her, she said her husband suffered a stroke last week and would have surgery soon. Also, she worries about exposure to coronavirus and transmitting it to elderly people she works with in a nursing home. After her exam, she told us how kind and understanding we were.

I've learned to see Christ in my patients and try to serve as Christ's hands to them. DeColores!
